The RP Group and the State Chancellor's Office have joined forces to develop *Leading From the Middle* (LFM) Academies to provide college stakeholders an opportunity to delve into relevant research and develop new ways to lead. Using themes from the Merritt College equity plan (and at the suggestion of faculty member Lowell Bennett), VPI Denise Richardson submitted an application on behalf of Merritt

College. On April 28th, we were notified that Merritt was selected.

During the fifteen-month Academy participants will have the opportunity to:

- Engage in experiential learning to explore effective leadership strategies.
- Formulate and articulate a collective and individual equity-minded leadership identity.
- **Develop and implement** a project that advances systemic equity-focused, student-centered reform efforts and aligns with their colleges' strategic priorities and the *Vision for Success*.
- Apply leadership skills and strategies to their day-to-day work and LFMproject.
- Examine data, research, and other forms of evidence to make informed decisions to advance their LFM project.
- Create sustainable professional relationships where peers share ideas and strategies around equity and transformative change.
- **Work** with a designated coach who will support and provide guidance throughout the LFM Academy.

Our acceptance letter stated, "We hope your experience will prepare you to take risks, disrupt old patterns, and create new ways of thinking, doing, and leading." Our team is looking forward to doing just that.



The National Cyber League (NCL) Spring 2023 season just concluded, and I want to take this opportunity to congratulate Merritt College's team of student/scholars (they go by the name *Merrittocracy*). To provide a bit of context, the mission of the NCL is to prepare the next generation of cybersecurity professionals by

Calvin Hsieh, William Dilbeck, Jeremiah Proffitt, Erica Dong, and James Toalu) placed 16 out of 3593 teams/players (which ranks them in the top 0.4 percentile)! This is an incredible acheivement, and attests to the talent and hard work of our students, as well as the support provided by sponsors and faculty members such as Jim Cates, Mark Egan, and Beverly Brooks.
